Alter in the Chapel

This World War II American Battle Monuments Cemetery lies just within the limits of Luxembourg City, about three miles east of the center of that capital. It can be reached by train from Paris (Gare de l'Est) in approximately four hours, from Liege, Belgium and from Frankfurt-am-Main, Germany. The airport is three miles northeast of the cemetery. Taxicabs are available at the Luxembourg Station and at the airport. There are several excellent hotels in the city.

The cemetery is fifty acres in extent. It is embellished with sculpture in bronze and stone, a stained glass window with American unit insignia and mosaic ceiling. In front of the chapel at a lower level are two large stone pylons with operations maps made of inlaid granites and accompanying inscriptions describing the achievements of American Armed Forces in the region during World War II. These pylons are inscribed with the names of 371 (MIA) Americans who gave their lives in the service of their country who ile in unknown graves. The cemetery was established on December 29, 1044. General Patton is burried at the Luxembourg Cemetery.

Sloping downhill from the memorial is the <u>burial area</u> <u>containing 5,076 American Dead</u>, many of whom gave their lives in the "Battle of the Bulge" and in the advance to the Rhine River.
