First Night In France – Marseille France


Disembarked the U.S.S. Monticello in Marseille Harbor.













3/23/1945 – The 103d overtook a retreating German column near Klingenmunster. Many of the motorized vehicles escaped. Horse drawn wagons did not. The horses and wagons were pushed off the road by tank units. The Germans were using horses due to the shortage of gasoline and many of the motorized units were sent to support operations in the Bulge campaign. Men of the 103d, marching at night, thought they were walking in mud. The next morning it was revealed that it was not mud, but the blood from the horses.



#### 3/23/1945 – Many prisoners were taken near Klingenmunster




The 103d Cactus Division broke through the Siegfried Line, overtaking the retreating German troops on March 23, 1945. The 103d took many prisoners.



On March 23, 1945, many horse drawn vehicles were encountered as the Germans were running low on gasoline.
