


The war's over and well deserved R&R is in order. Very few can boast skiing in the Austrian Alps down an Olympic ski run.







Before shipping off to Japan and the South Pacific, there was just enough time for a short trip to Paris.






Eiffel Tower with a U.S. bomber parked beneath.





The low point was when the men of the 409<sup>th</sup> Infantry were transferred from the 103d Infantry Division to the 45<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division for shipment from Le Havre to Bornmouth, England. From there they would go on to the Pacific and Japan. V-J Day came after the ship was loaded so the men sailed from Southhampton to Camp Shanks, NY. From there it was a troop train to San Francisco, via Canada, for the first big Army parade after V-J

Day. After San Francisco, it was on to Fort Lewis, Washington to occupy a recently vacated German POW base where the barbed wire fences and concertina wire were still around the barracks. After Fort Lewis it was back to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio to process for discharge.
