I -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded to following named individual:

PIRST LIEUTENANT SERRED S. MELSON, O1823192, Field Artillery, Second Reconnaissance Platoon, 61Ath Tank Destroyer Battalion. For gallantry in action. On 23 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, when a reconnaissance party of a task force was ambushed by 50 of the enemy and ordered to surrender, LHEUTENANT NELSON opened fire with his light machine gun, enabling the group to withdraw without loss. Retracing their route, the party was stopped by a wagon placed as a hasty roadblock and covered by automatic weapon fire. LHEUTENANT NELSON dismounted, opened fire, assisted in moving the wagon from the road and led his men safely to the rear of the task force. A short time later, the task force was subjected to enemy fire from high ground and a mostile attempt was made to free prisoners in the rear of the column. LIEUTENANT NELSON organized his men, returned the fire and broke up the hostile attempt. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Omaha, Nabraska

II -- MIARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Lronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

Sergeant Elijah Gibson, 34550577, Field artillery, Headquarters Company, 614th Tank bestroyer Battalion. For heroism in action. On 19 March 1945, near ** * *, Germany, when a blown oridge prevented a reconnaissance platoon from moving forward in their vehicles, Sergeant Gibson proceeded forward to a position to observe enemy dispositions. He opened fire on three of the enemy that he observed on the road and the enemy immediately fired upon the platoon from well concealed positions. Disregarding the enemy fire, Sergeant Gibson continued firing and observing the enemy positions, until he was wounded. Before being evacuated beyond the platoon command post, Sergeant Gibson pointed out on a map the exact locations of the enemy positions. This information

proved to be of valuable assistance in the planning of future operations. Sergeant Gibson's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Savannah, Georgia.

Private First Class Ronald Pollard, 38063301, Field artillery, Headquarters Company, 614th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroism in action. During the night of 22 Karch 1945; near * * *, Germany, a motorized reconnaissance platoon was ambushed by the enemy and further progress was halted by a wagon placed as a temporary readdlock. Private Pollard immediately fired his light machine gun until it jammed, then using his sub-machine gun until he expended the ammunition, he picked up a machine gun from a member of the platoon and continued firing. Disregarding heavy enemy fire, he led a small group of men and directed the removal of the wagon, permitting the platoon to escape and continue its mission. Private Pollard's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Sweetsprings, Missouri.

CAPTAIN REAURECARD KING, 0412501, Field artillery, Company "A", 614th Tank Destroyer Battelion. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945, CAPTAIN KING, planned and organized a small task force for an attack on * * *, France. Leading his men in the attack, CAPTAIN KING was severely wounded by enemy automatic weapon fire. After falling to the ground, he called to his second in command and urged him to continue the attack, which resulted in the capture of the village and the taking of a number of prisoners. CAPTAIN KING's outstanding leadership reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Tabuco, alabama.

Sergeant Matthew Spencer, 35479070, Field artillery, Second Reconnaissance Flatoon, 614th Tank Destroyer Battalian. For heroism in action, Buring the night of 22 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, a motorized task force reconnaissance Section was halted by heavy enemy automatic Weapon fire from both sides of the road. In the action that followed, an enemy officer armed with a submachine gun attempted to shoot bergeant Spencer's platoon leader. Sergeant Spencer knocked the enemy officer off balance with the butt of his caroine, deflecting the enemy officer's fire. After the enemy soldier was killed, Sergeant Spencer assisted in the direction of fire into the hostile positions, enabling the section to proceed on its mission. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Louisville, Kentucky.

FIRST LIEUTENANT HAROLD B. GARY, OlC31244, Cavalry, Company "B", 761st Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On the night of 23 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, LIEUTINANT GARY, in command of the point of a task force, was fired on by two enemy anti-tank weapons. Due to the darkness, the exact location of the enemy weapons could not be determined. LIEUTENANT GARY, without hesitation, maneuvered his force and his own tank into a position from which offective fire was directed upon the hostile positions. LIEUTENANT GARY's courage and initiative, which permitted the remainder of the task force to accomplish its mission, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: abilene, Kansas.

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GO #100, Hq 103d Inf Div, dtd 6 Apr 45 II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (Contld)

Private First Class Thomas L. Kilgo, Jr., 34461097, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 614th Tank Lestroyer Battalion. For heroism in action. On 15 March 1945, Private Kilgo, medical aid man, was attached to a small task force attacking * * *, France, when heavy enemy automatic weapon fire wounded the task force commander. Disregarding the enemy fire, Private Kilgo made his way over the open ground and administered aid to the fallen officer. Private Kilgo's actions, resulting in the prompt evacuation of a wounded man, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Asheville, North Carolina.

Sergeant Buck A. Smith, 38063430, Armored, Company "C", 761st Tank Battalion. For heroism in action. On 22 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, Sergeant Smith, tank commander, was assigned the mission of destroying enemy automatic weapons and previously picked pillboxes with a single tank. Although only covered by infantry troops on the adjacent hill and without close protection, Sergeant Smith moved his tank in range of hostile positions. Sergeant Smith remained exposed in the turret, despite hostile anti-tank, artillery and mortar fire, and directed accurate fire which destroyed numerous enemy automatic weapons and effectively damaged several pillboxes. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Staff Sergeant Charles L. Parks, 34459861, Field artillery, Company "a", 614th Tank Lestroyer Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945, Sergeant Parks assisted in planning and organizing an attack by a small task force on * * *, France. When the task force commander was wounded, Sergeant Parks took command and led the group over open ground in the face of heavy enemy automatic weapon fire to take the village and capture a number of the enemy. Sergeant Park's display of courage and leadership reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Charlotte, North Carolina.

III -- AWARD OF OAK-LEAF CLUSTER TO AIR MEDAL. Under the provisions of army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster to air Medal is awarded to following named individuals for meritorious service while participating in aerial flight:



I -- ATARD OF BRONZE STAR 1 TOAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

Technical Sergeant Chorles E. Adams, 6958347, (then Sergeant), Infantry, Cannon Company, Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 21 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, Sergeant Adams' platoon was subjected to intense enemy heavy artillery fire, one round of which ignited ammunition containers, causing a fire that threatened three howitzers and their crews. Disregarding the threat to his life from enemy rounds still falling around him, Sergeant Adams extinguished the fire and removed the burning containers. His actions, which prevented loss of lives and equipment, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Victoria, Texas.

Private First Class Mark H. Ray, 34302120, Field Artillery, Headquarters. Company, 614th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroism in action. On 19 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, when a blown bridge provented a recommalisance platoon from moving forward in their vuhicles, Frivate Ray advanced on foot, carrying his machine cun. The platoon was immediately pinned down by heavy enemy machine gun fire from four well concealed amplacements, which wounded his section sergeant. Disregarding the enemy fire, Private Ray assisted the wounded man to the platoon command post, where he aided in pointing out on a map, the exact lossion of the enemy positions. This information proved to be of valuable assistance in the planning of future operations. Frivate Ray's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Franklin, North Carolina.

SECOND LIEUTENANT JOHN A. BAKER, 02000697, Infantry, Headquarters, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 21 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, LIEUTENANT BAKER, assistant \$-3, was observing an infantry company's flanking advance on enemy pillboxes, when the company was subjected to fire from a concealed pillbox on an adjacent hill. LIEUTENANT BAKER ran to a captured enemy 47 millimeter gun and, although unfamiliar with the weapon, fired on the strongpoint from a distance of 250 yards. Despite intermittent artillery and eniper fire which once forced him to take cover, LIEUTENANT BAKER con-

tinued firing until the pillbox was neutralized. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Peoria, Illimois.

Technician Fifth Grade Robert R. Sorber, 36713068, Field Artillery, Head-quarters Battery, 384th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. On the night of 22-23 March 1945, in * * *, Germany, Technician Sorber and three commades took cover in the cellar of a building from heavy enemy mortar and artillery fire. One shell penetrated the building and exploded in the cellar, wounding three men and burying one of them under the debris. Technician Sorber, with his bare hands, dig his buried commade from the rubble, administered first aid to the wounded, and then dashed 200 yards through the intense shell fire to the aid station to secure assistance. He returned to his commades and assisted in the evacuation of one seriously wounded man to the aid station. Technician Sorber's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Orlando, Florida.

Frivate First Class alonzo D. Kimball, 34516211, Infantry, Company "I", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 20 Farch 1945, near * * *, Germany, during an ittack on a fortified hill, Private Kimball stood erect and advanced toward an enemy pilitox, firing his automatic rifle as he walked. Although two enemy granades exploded near him, Frivate Kimball continued his assault on the emplacement, forcing an enemy machine gameer to leave the safety of the pillbox and surrender. Frivate Kimball's initiative and aggressiveness reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Hesidence: York, South Carolim.

Sergennt "alter D. Rice, 14136463, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "I", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 20 Narch 1945, near * * *, Germany, during an attack on a fortified hill, Company "I" was subjected to mortar and artillery barrages and was herassed by fire from an enemy sniper. Private Rice, acting squad leader, cautiously advanced to within sight of the sniper and attempted to fire his automatic rifle, but it failed to function. Discovered and fired on, Private Rice threw a grenade, wounding the sniper who then surrendered. Private Rice's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: St. Petersburg, Florida.

GAPTAIN EARL E. MING, 01172515, Field Artillery, Headquarters Bettery, 382d Field Artillery Battalion, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 19 to 22 March 1945, in France and Germany. Residence: Osawatomie, Kansas.

CAPTAIN FRANCIS CAM, C1175064, Field artillery, Battery "B", 382d Field Artillery Battalion, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 19 to 22 March 1945, in France and Cermany. Residence: Newark, New Jersey.

CAFTAIN DOMALD A. MCLEAN, 0440436, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 382d Field Artillery Battalion, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 19 to 22 March 1945, in France and Germany. Residence: Pinghamton, New York.

LIMITEMANT COLONEL FAUL L. BATES, C280450, Infantry, Headquarters, 761st Tenk Battalion, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 22 to 23 Burch 1945, in Germany. Residence: Boom Town, New Jersey.

On 20 March 1945, Private Spees had driven over 500 yards of fire swept road to ** *, Germany, evacuating casualties, when he observed a wounded man lying in a ditch 50 yards from the outskirts of town. Although enemy machine gan fire had halted previous attempts to reach the man, Private Spees crawled 50 yards to the easualty. Private Spees, discovering the casualty suffering from a savere chest wound, dragged him to his vehicle and drove the man through the hostile fire to the battelion aid station. His actions, which saved the life of a wounded comrade, reflected the highest traditions of the military scrvice. Residence: Lake Nebagamon, "isconsin.

Frivate First Class Elmer R. Pinnow, 36553885, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 20 March 1945, thring the attack on * * *, Germany, the mounded were placed in houses on the outskirts of town, awaiting evacuation. Two medical vehicles were destroyed and the occupants wounded in an attempt to drive over the fire swept road. Realizing the casualties were in need of immediate evacuation, Private Pinnow drove his vehicle at top speed through a hail of small arms fire, crossed two bridges covered by machine gun cross fire, and successfully entered the town. Private Pinnow's actions, which enabled soveral wounded men to be evacuated, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Precland, Michigan.

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
I -- A MARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded to following named individual:

Frivate First Class Carmine Varano, 12160997, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 15 March 1945, near * * *, France, Infantry, attacking across an open field, met intense enemy machine gun and artillery fire and was forced to withdraw 600 yards to cover. Observing several men fall wounded as the troops withdrew, Frivate Varano returned to the field, administered aid to the men and directed the walking wounded to cover. Although painfully wounded in the arm by a shell fragment, Frivate Varano carried a seriously wounded can to cafety. Despite the continued hostile fire, he entered the field again and carried the last seriously wounded can to cover. Frivate Varano's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Union City, New Jersey.

II -- A"ARD, FOSTRULOUS, OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to following named individual:

Staff Sergeant Jack Derrell, 37068411, Infantry, Company "D", 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 17 March 1945, near * * *, France, when the First Battalion, 411th Infantry was held up by heavy enemy mortar fire, Sergeant Derrell criwled forward to locate the hostile weapon. Carrying a captured radio for communications, he located the enemy mortar, but before he was able to register fire, he was discovered and mortally wounded by a mortar barrage. Despite his mortal wounds, Sergeant Derrell remained at his post, directing fire until the hostile position was knocked out. Sergeant Derrell's actions, which enabled the battalion to continue its advance, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Bald Knob, Arkansas. Next of kin: Mrs. Dacle Derrell, ("life), Route 1, Bald Knob, Arkansas.

Informed that houses on the outskirts of the village were being used as collecting points for the wounded, LIEUTEMANT FORD secured an aid chost and crawled 400 yards through continuous enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire to the buildings. After he dressed the wounds and administered plasma to the seriously wounded, LIEUTEMANT FORD, despite the hostile fire, reconncitered and discovered a concealed route to the aid station over which the litter teams successfully evacuated the casualties. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Trinity, Texas.

Technical Sergeant Parl C. Pike, 6530361, Infantry, Company "D", Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 17 March 1945, when the First Pattalion, 411th Infantry was halted by enemy machine gun fire near * * *, France, and machine gun support was needed, Sergeant Pike immediately ran forward through the enemy fire to locate a position for the support. Finding an advantageous point from which to direct fire upon the enemy, he returned and led his squad forward. Although wounded, Sergeant Pike moved his squad into position and directed effective fire, neutralizing the hostile positions. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Steel City, Nebracka.

Staff Scrgeant John A. Johancen, Jr., 33560966, Infantry, Company "I", AlOth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 27 January 1945, near * * *, France, the Third Platoon of Company "I", outposting our main line of resistance, was forced to withdraw when attacked by a numerically superior enemy which was supported by self-propolled guns and heavy mortars. After the withdrawal had been completed, Sergeant Johancen discovered a wounded man lying near his previous position. Disregarding small arms and artillery fire, he made his way to the casualty and carried the man 500 yards to the safety of our lines. Sergeant Johancen's actions in saving the life of a comrade, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Baltimore, Naryland.

Sergeant "illiam "alenezak, 36548976, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945, during an attack by the First Battalion, 410th Infantry, near * * *, France, Sergeant alenezak, although severely wounded which necessitated later evacuation, carried his radio approximately 800 yards, under enemy small arms, mortar, machine gun and artillery fire, continuing his mission and maintaining communication. He was then ordered to remain behind and await a litter squad for evacuation. "Thile awaiting evacuation he was of material assistance in directing assault rifle companies in the proper direction of the attack. Sergeant "alenezak's devotion to duty reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

IV -- A TARD, POSTHUNOUS, OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to following named individuals:

Frivate First Class Marion J. Hornick, 37679241, Infantry, Company "H", 41th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 18 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, Private Hornick and an officer were forced to leave their one-quarter ton truck and take cover when subjected to small arms fire from twelve dug-in enemy. Refusing to abandon his vehicle, Private Hornick, disregarding the intense enemy fire, left his place of cover, ran to his truck, and although wounded twice, drove at to cover. Private Hornick's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Puyallup, "Ashington. Mext of kin: Mrs. Joseph ne Hornick (Mother) 232 4th Ave., N."., Puyallup, Washington.

Sergeant illium D. Stafford, 32331999, Infantry, Company "D", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 21 March 1945, near **, Germany, when attacking infantry was stopped by fire from well concealed enemy pillboxes, Sergeant Stafford accompanied two officers and several men to reconneiter for machine gun positions. As the party advanced through a woods, fire from a pillbox only 30 yards distant killed three men and wounded the two officers. Despite the continuous enemy fire, Sergeant Stafford crawled 100 yards to a point beyond the range of enemy fire and then ran to his company. He quickly organized two machine gun platoons, led them forward and directed machine gun fire which neutralized the pillbox. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: New York, N

A WARD OF THE SECOND CAK-LEAF CLUSTER

Private First Class Hjalmar M. Engeland, 37541978, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 20 March 1945, during the attack on 200, Germany, Private Engeland, while ovacunting a seriously funded man with his medical vehicle over 500 yards of exposed road, met heavy enemy fire which shattered the windshield and damaged the engine. Disregarding the continuous hostile fire, Private Engeland dismounted, lifted the wounded man in his arms, and carried him 150 yards to safety. Private Engeland then ran back to his vehicle and pushed it 150 yards to cover. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Barton, North Dakota.

On 15 March 1945, near * * *, France, Technician Solomon, radio operator with a forward observer, although wounded, exposed himself to enemy small arms, machine gun, artillery and mortar fire to maintain communications between the attacking company and his bettery. Disregarding enemy machine gun fire which tore through his outer clothing, Technician Solomon remained several hours in an exposed position, transmitting fire directions and maintaining communications. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.
