His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Wendal, California.

Private First Class Robert G. Angel, 35557136, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battelion, 410th Infantry Regiment, For heroic achievement in action. On 6 March 1945, Frivate Angel voluntarily lead a patrol into Noiffern, France, to obtain information relative to enemy dispositions. The patrol was forced to repeat its mission on two successive nights due to the mosalight which revealed its presence. On the third attempt, Frivate Angel, crawled to within 100 yards of an enemy machine gun position, probing the road for mines. The information obtained by him materially assisted in the later successful attack on the town. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Sesidence: Elkhart, Indians.

Screent Charles R. Atkinson, 17169934, Infantry, Company "G", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945 near Engwiller, France, when his company was held up by enemy small arms, machine

When his squad was pinned down by artillery, machine gan and small arms fire he crawled forward 200 yards and throwing two hand grenades into a hostile emplecement, killed two of the enemy and forced eight more to surrender. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. He sidence: King, Kentucky.

Staff Sorgaint Garland V. Sharp, 36548760, Infantry, Company "S", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 22 April 1945 in Erkenbrotchswiller, Germany, Sorgaint Sharp, alone in the attic of a house, saw the enemy forming for an attack. Leaving the House he made his way to the edge of town and disregarding machine gun fire, he fired into the enemy forces. When the enemy were less than 300 yards distant, he organized a group in a strong defensive position and withstood the attack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the hilitary service. Residence: Dearborn, Hichigan.

Private First Class Faul A. Foley, 31285580, Infantry, Company "D", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 24 January 1945, near Mihlhausen, France, when the attacking enemy forced our troops to withdraw, Private Foley carried a sick commade 300 yards through enemy small arms and eaching gun fire to safety. He then remained behind covering the withdrawal of eight other soldiers. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Longhesdow, Massachusetts.

CAPTAIN EARL C. THOWAS, 01296938, Infantry, Headquarters 410th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 10 November 1944 to 8 May 1945 in France, Germany and Austria. Residence: East Crosco, Lowa.

Tochnical Sergment Bill Hodges, 34151064, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. I -- A ARD OF ERONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 6CO-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Kedal is awarded to following named individuals:

Private First Class Syllus P. Luckadoo, 34922327, Infantry, Company "C", 411th Infantry Regiment: For heroic achievement in action. On 16 March 1945 near Muhlhausen, France, Private Luckadoo's platoon was halted by automatic weapon and artillery fire and its withdrawal was prevented by a well placed nachine gun. Private Luckadoo, digregarding the enemy fire, crawled to the top of an embankment and, firing two well aimed shots, killed the gunner and assistant garner of the mehine gun emplacement, enabling his platoon to withdraw. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Sewance, Tennessee.

Staff Sergeant Gilbert R. Ryback, 35960105, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "C", Allth Infantry Regiment: For heroic achievement in action. On 14 December 1944 near lamperslotch, France, Sergeant Ryback was first secut for his company when he observed an enemy self-propelled gun. Opening fire immediately, he killed the observer standing in the turnet of the vehicle and, despite machine gun fire, continued harassing fire, permitting a group to flank the gun and force its withdrawel. In the action that followed 90 prisoners were taken. Sergeant Ryback's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Milwaukee, % sconsin.

Sergeant William A. Knott, 34464717, Infantry, Company "M", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 21 April 1945 near Schorndorf, Germany, when a roadblock halted the advance of an attacking battalion, Sergeant Knott, riding the lead vehicle, drove forward in order to bring effective fire on the enemy emplacement. Disregarding small arms fire, he reached a point within 100 yards of the enemy and, personally manning the neutroned machine gun, fired effectively and disreganized the enemy. We then returned to the battalion commander with vital information relative to the Foadblock which was then destroyed by our artillary fire. Sergeant Knott's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Stovall, North Carolina.

Sergosht Arpad J. Kovaes, 36547994, Infantry, Company "M", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 27 April 1945 near Stoffenreid, Cormany, when a one quarter ten truck hit a mine, the vehicle was demolished

and four occupants were wounded. Sergeant Fowacs, suffering from a broken arm, disregarded his pain and rendered aid to his critically injured company commander as well as to the two other injured men. He continued his assistance until he fell to the ground unconscious. Sergeant Towacs' actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class James B. McFarland, 37746020, Infantry, Company "C", fullth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 22 March 1945 near Mieder Schlettenbach, Germany, when Private McFarland's company was cut off b" machine gum, morter, artillery and small arms fire and ordered to withdraw, eight men were isolated from the company. Private McFarland, upon learning of the plight of the eight men, digregarding the enemy fire, crossed 75 yards of fire-swept terrain, contacted the men and personally led them to the safety of our lines. Frivate McFarland's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: California, Missouri.

Sorgeant William G. Schwab, Jr., 36151290, Infantry, Company "G", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 26 November 1944 near Combriment, France, Sergeant Schwab led his equad over a new route to contact an adjacent company. Passing through a village, he was informed that the enemy still occupied a few of the buildings. When a heavy fire fight ensued, Sergeant Schwab made his way to his bazooka gunner, obtained the weapon and returned the point of the heaviest fire. Deliberately exposing himself to the enemy fire, he fired one recket, knocked out a machine gun, killed the crew and forced 13 of the enemy to surrender. Sergeant Schwab's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Bay City, Michigan.

Private First Class Clifford I. Tripp, 11018549, Infantry, Headquarters. Commany, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 18 March 1945 during the rapid advance from Jogenthal, France to Bobenthal, Germany, it was necessary to lay 24 miles of wire to maintain communications. In the nevement forward when a half mile section of a mined read was encountered, Private Tripp voluntarily drove his vehicle along the mined road laying wire. Then summoning his wire crew, he continued his mission and succeeded in providing constant communications. Private Tripp's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Mattapoisett,

Staff Sorgest Leelie A. Wallace, 37250431, (then Sorgeant), lafantry, Company "H", Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 10 January 1945 near Theding, Franco, after Company "H", Allth Infantry had established a forward morter observation post, the battalien was pinned down by artillery, morter and machine gun fire which severed the communication wire Sorgeant Tallace, disregarding the hostile fire, crawled 300 yards and repaired the line. After returning to his foxhole, he once again exposed himself to crawl 400 yards to repair another break. His attions, which enabled the observer to direct effective counterfire, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Anamoga, Iowa.

On 14 December 1944, Private Arnold was hauling his company's machine game and norters in his vehicle during a task force attack on Chimberh, France, when the forward elements of the column were pinned down by intense artillery, norter and machine game fire, suffering heavy capualtice. Driving forward through the hostile fire, he distributed wearons and amminition to the weapons platoon and then, driving 1000 vards forward to the creat of a hill where teveral man lay wounded, executed two men to the aid station. Returning several times, he continued to execute the casualties until his webicle was disabled by hostile fire. Frivate Arnold's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class Francis R. Petska, 36288759, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 11 March 1945, Private Petska, Teading a patrol on a mission to set up readblocks in enemy territory, after noticing an enemy patrol entering our lines, notified the outpost guard and continued on his mission. Continuing on, he set up two readblocks near Nieffern, France, four miles behind the enemy lines on their min supply route and then safely returned to his company. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military process. Residence: Endcome, Tasconsin.

'On' 10 January 1945 near Forbach, France, when his company not stiff resistance and suffered minerous casualties, LIEUTEMANT DOBBS went forward under machine gun and small arms fire to assume command of the company. Or bored to withdraw, he personally contacted all men of the company and, after socing that all wounded were evacuated, led the company in a rapid withdrawal without further casualties. LIEUTEMANT DOBPS was reported killed in a subsequent action. His outstanding leadership reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Plano, Illinois. Next of kin: Mrs Ons Dobbs, (Nother), 503 North Center Avenue, Flaro, Illinois.
