I-- AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded to following named individual:

FIRST LIEUTENANT WALTER P. FRIDINGER, 01319615, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 20 March 1945 near Nieder Schlettenbach, Germany, when heavy machine gun fire from enemy pillboxes slowed the advance, LIEUTENANT FRIDINGER deployed his men and continued the attack. Rushing to the lead tank through the machine gun fire, he directed fire against the first pillbox and then leading a small assault force captured the emplacement. Reorganizing his men and delayed by a blown bridge he plunged into a stream and calling for his men to follow him made his way over 75 yards of exposed terrain to the buildings at the edge of town. Returning for tank support, he exposed himself to the enemy fire to direct the fire of the tanks which reduced many of the enemy strongpoints. As he was returning to his company he was seriously wounded by a mortar burst. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: South Portland, Maine.

II-- AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to following named individual:

Private First Class William H. Neimeyer, 36245881, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 29 April 1945 in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany. When the tank on which he was riding plunged off a bridge into the swiftly rushing waters below and threatened to overturn in six feet of water, Private Neimeyer dived in. Disregarding the threat of the tank overturning, he pulled away the tank's aerial which had pinned an officer under water. He then pulled the officer from under the tank and brought him safely to shore. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hasbrouck Heights, New Jersey.

III -- AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

Sergeant Arthur W. Kopf, 32920149, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "M", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 18 December 1944 near Bobenthal, Germany, when a rifle company and an attached weapons platoon were pinned down by intense mortar, machine gun and small arms fire from enemy pillboxes, Sergeant Kopf seized a heavy machine gun and dashed 25 yards up a hill to an advantageous position. Although drawing the enemy's fire, he continued to man his machine gun, enabling the company to continue its advance. Sergeant Kopf's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hackensack, New Jersey.

Sergeant Gene M. Bane, 37665174, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 22 March 1945 near Erlenbach, Germany, when a roadblock covered by mortar and artillery fire prevented delivery of ammunition to forward companies, Sergeant Bane voluntarily secured demolitions and ran 50 yards toward the obstacle. Although forced to crawl 40 yards, he reached the roadblock and disregarding the hostile fire which showered him with dirt and debris, successfully placed the charges. Lighting a fuse, he dashed 50 yards to the safety of a ditch as the roadblock was demolished. Sergeant Bane's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Knoxville, Iowa.

Private First Class John J. Pitrus, 12171398, (then Private), Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 19 January 1945 during an attack on Sessenheim, France, when communication lines were severed by artillery and mortar fire, Private Pitrus voluntarily followed the communication line from the forward observation post to the battalion command post for 1800 yards, repairing breaks under hostile fire. Despite the continued hostile fire, he then repaired the breaks in the telephone line between the mortar and forward observation posts. Private Pitrus' actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hartford, Connecticut.

Sergeant Delph W. Mitchell, 36623666, Infantry, Company "M", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 24 April 1945 near Munsingen, Germany, when the lead vehicle of a motorized column was destroyed by anti-tank fire and the column subjected to small arms and machine gun fire, Sergeant Mitchell, riding in the second vehicle, fired the mounted machine gun on the enemy positions as his comrades dismounted. Then, disregarding the continued enemy fire, he ordered his vehicle to be driven alongside the destroyed vehicle and, firing belt after belt of ammunition, laid a covering fire which enabled aid men to conduct a speedy evacuation of the wounded. Sergeant Mitchell's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hartford, Illinois.

Technician Fourth Grade Clarence A. Baenen, 36809146, Field Artillery, Service Battery, 928th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On the night of 19 January 1945 near Mietshain, France, after the

battalion had withdrawn to defensive positions, Technician Baeson, informed that a truck loaded with ammunition had crashed into a house, voluntarily drove his wrecker back over the route. Although warned by infantry rear guards of enemy patrols in the area, he continued on and evacuated the damaged vehicle and its cargo over the ice-covered road to the battalion. Technician Baeson's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Stiles, Wisconsin.

SECOND LIEUTENANT JOHN L. SEXTON, 02000666, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945 during an attack near Metesheden, France, LIEUTENANT SEXTON advanced through mined areas under a concentration of artillery fire to the lead company. When the company was halted by intense cross and frontal fire, he advanced ahead of the men to a position on a hill and, although subjected to mortar and artillery fire, directed effective artillery fire while the company consolidated its position. LIEUTENANT SEXTON'S actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Calvin, North Dakota.

Private First Class Kenneth D. Banning, 37685502, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 3 May 1945 during the attack on Zirl, Austria, Company "A", 409th Infantry was subjected to enemy small arms fire while proceeding down the side of a mountain. Private Banning, disregarding the enemy fire, stood upright firing his BAR into the enemy positions. His fire was so effective that his platoon continued the advance without suffering a single casualty. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Bridgewater, South Dakota.

IV -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations, 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to following named individual:

Staff Sergeant Edward A. Hoff, 36338636, Infantry, Service Company, 411th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 16 November 1944 to 28 January 1945 in France and Germany. Residence: Mokenst, Illinois. Next of Kin: Mrs Lillian Hoff (Wife), Rayco, Louisiana.

I -- AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

FIRST LIEUTENANT LEONARD P. O'DAY, O1310484, (then SECOND LIEUTENANT), Cavalry, 103d Reconnaissance Troop. For heroic achievement in action. On 17 November 1944, prior to the attack on ST. Die, France, the city was set afire by the enemy and a food shortage caused the population to threaten to congest the roads in flight. LIEUTENANT O'DAY formed a five man patrol to lead military government personnel into the city in order to calm the people. Under cover of darkness, he advanced down a mountain into a valley and, carefully avoiding minefields and hostile positions, entered the city. After secretly meeting FFI leaders, the group arranged for food for the population and then returned to friendly lines by daybreak. LIEUTENANT O'DAY'S actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Binghamton, New York.

Private Marvin D. Cole, 36412486, Medical Department, Company "B", 328th, Medical Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 25 January 1945 near Schillersdorf, France, when the enemy launched a strong attack the aid station was ordered to withdraw and abandon all vehicles. In the attempt to withdraw part of the group was fired upon by the enemy from approximately 50 yards away. Private Cole on his own initiative and disregarding automatic weapons and artillery fire made his way to an ambulance and evacuated eight men to the safety of our lines. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Niles, Michigan.

II -- AWARD OF PURPLE HEART. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Purple Heart is awarded to following named individuals for wounds or injuries received in action against the enemy:
