

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL I
AWARD OF OAK-LEAF CLUSTER TO PURPLE HEART II

I -- AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

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Private First Class Harland B. Davis, 36401259, Infantry, Company "F", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 15 March 1945 near Zinswiller, France, when an intense artillery barrage wounded his comrade, Private Davis left the shelter of his fox hole and ran 75 yards through the barrage to the side of the wounded man. After administering first aid, he dragged the casualty to a fox hole which was too small to hold both men. Placing the casualty in the fox hole, Private Davis remained beside him rendering aid for thirty minutes until the artillery barrage lifted. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Highland, Michigan.

Technical Sergeant Colin E. Spencer, 14021185, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 382d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 2 May 1945, near Seefeld, Austria, when it became imperative to lay a communication line to the Liaison Officer, Sergeant Spencer was given the task. Although not knowing the exact location of the Liaison Officer, he started laying the line. After bypassing two enemy patrols he reached the coordinate, where the officer was last reported, but unable to find him, Sergeant Spencer continued on. Finally locating the officer, he established communications enabling artillery fire to be directed more accurately. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hickory, North Carolina.

Private First Class Carl J. Eford, 33909938, Infantry, Company "F", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 30 December 1944, near Schren, France, when a rifle platoon, attacking high ground was pinned down by intense enemy fire, Private Eford placed his machine gun in an exposed position and fired on three enemy emplacements. Although the hostile fire was diverted upon his position, he remained and directed accurate fire, killing three enemy machine gunners and forcing the remainder of the crew to flee in disorder. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Baltimore, Maryland.

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Private First Class William Mielotz, 36818191, Infantry, Company "F", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic action. On the night of 28 November 1944 Private Mielotz was guarding the company command post in Andlau, France, when he observed an enemy soldier in a vineyard 50 yards distant. Firing his rifle, Private Mielotz dashed toward the soldier, demanding his surrender. Observing nine more of the enemy about to ambush the command post, he opened fire and, despite the enemy's close range fire, killed two of the enemy and forced the remainder to flee. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Staff Sergeant Charles E. Pepper, Jr., 14157891, Infantry, Company "F", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 16 March 1945 near Zinswiller, France, Sergeant Pepper volunteered to clear a road of anti-tank mines in order that supporting tanks could be brought up. Disregarding mortar and machine gun fire, he moved down the side of the road. Upon reaching the mines he tied four of them together and detonated them in a safe position. After he removed the mines, a platoon of tanks moved forward and directed effective fire into the enemy emplacements. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Pittsburg, Tennessee.

FIRST LIEUTENANT WILLIAM G. DEERLE, JR., 026310, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 22 April 1945, while reconnoitering a route of approach to Gutenberg, Germany, LIEUTENANT DEERLE was subjected to artillery and small arms fire but continued on and formed a plan for the clearing of the town. Sending his runner back to bring up his company, he placed himself at its head and led it down a 300 foot cliff and cleared the town. His outstanding leadership and planning enabled the town to be taken without loss to our troops and reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: East Greenwich, Rhode Island.

Staff Sergeant Joseph S. Zielenka, 36549192, (then Sergeant), Infantry, Company "F", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 23 January 1945, near Schilleradorf, France, Sergeant Zielenka was injured during a counterattack by SS Troops. Although his arm and shoulder were temporarily paralyzed, he remained with his machine gun section and directed the repair of one gun. Discovering an ammunition shortage, he made his way alone over 500 yards and returned with the vital ammunition. Only then did he permit himself to be evacuated. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class Raymond E. Wooten, 6389924, Infantry, Cannon Company, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 10 January 1945 near Behren, France, when Company "F", 411th Infantry, was ordered to withdraw, fire from two machine guns and snipers prevented its withdrawal. Private Wooten called for support from Cannon Company and learning of an ammunition shortage used only three rounds to adjust fire on the enemy emplacements and then directed fire which eliminated the two machine guns, killing five of the enemy and forcing the snipers to withdraw. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Vass, North Carolina.

Sergeant Diego C. Ross, 38462856, Infantry, Company "E", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 9 February 1945, sergeant Ross volunteered to lead a reconnaissance patrol to determine enemy dispositions near Bischholz, France. When fired upon by the enemy, he cautioned his men not to return the fire. After obtaining valuable information, he led the patrol back to friendly lines by crawling through a mine field. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Helotes, Texas.

Technician Third Grade Henry Unger, 36530391, Infantry, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Seventh Army, (then Headquarters Company, 411th Infantry Regiment). For heroic achievement in action. On 18 March 1945, near Wingen, France, when a sniper fired upon the LPV team's vehicle, Technician Unger immediately leaped from it and dashed toward the sniper's position. Disregarding the sniper's fire, he charged the position, firing his pistol forcing the enemy to surrender. Questioning the prisoner, he obtained valuable information of other snipers and positions which was rapidly passed on to forward rifle companies, permitting the capture of them without casualties to our troops. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class Maynard A. Brooks, 31466856, Infantry, Company "A", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 19 December 1944, near Reisdorf, Germany, when the enemy threw grenades into his company's positions, Private Brooks stood up in his position and hurled several fragmentation grenades into the hostile trenches. Then rising again, he fired his automatic rifle, forcing the enemy to take shelter in a pillbox. Private Brooks continued to fire on the emplacement, enabling his company to move from its position and to evacuate the wounded. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Cherry Field, Maine.

Staff Sergeant Samuel T. Gann, 38467903, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "A", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 24 November 1944, near Maisongotte, France, when machine gun fire on the company's flank inflicted several casualties, Sergeant Gann maneuvered through the hostile fire and located the hostile gun. He fired his automatic rifle from the hip, silencing the machine gun and killing a four man crew. Sergeant Gann's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Tulsa, Oklahoma.

First Sergeant John A. Lovold, 6861608, Infantry, Company "D", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 4 May 1945 in Brenner, Austria, Sergeant Lovold organized a motorized patrol of two vehicles to advance through hostile territory to contact elements of the Fifth Army in Italy. Enroute, Sergeant Lovold passed artillery crews and enemy road blocks. At one point when four of the enemy stopped the patrol at a road block, Sergeant Lovold fully loaded a mounted machine gun, ordered the gate to be opened, and continued on. Advancing several miles farther, Sergeant Lovold and his

men effected the linking up of the Seventh and Fifth Armies. Sergeant Loveld's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Redfield, South Dakota.

Technician Third Grade James M. Smith, 34494919, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 23 November 1944, near Maisongotte, France, when artillery fire inflicted casualties, Technician Smith made his way through the hostile fire and administered aid. After all the casualties had been evacuated, he then searched the entire area for additional casualties before seeking cover. Technician Smith's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Decaturville, Tennessee.

Technical Sergeant Elmer W. Lauf, 33267202, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 26 November 1944 in Maisongotte, France, when artillery fire struck a vehicle and set it into flames, Sergeant Lauf, advanced toward the vehicle. Before reaching the vehicle, a shell burst wounded two nearby soldiers and himself. Disregarding his own wound, Sergeant Lauf carried one of the men to the aid station, and then returning to the vehicle, searched the area for casualties, before allowing his injury to be dressed. Sergeant Lauf's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Fair Oaks, Pennsylvania.

Technician Third Grade John B. Gontjes, 37446225, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 26 November 1944 near Maisongotte, France, when artillery fire inflicted heavy casualties, Technician Gontjes left his place of safety, recruited three infantrymen to act as litter bearers, and evacuated the wounded. On the night of 18 January 1945, near Schirwoffen, France, when a vehicle fell from a bridge into a creek, pinning the occupants under the water, he organized a rescue party and, although hindered by darkness, directed the removal of the men without loss of life. Residence: Sibley, Iowa.

SECOND LIEUTENANT JAMES W. BOLDING, 02007136, (then Technical Sergeant), Infantry, Company "M", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 29 November 1944, near Herwarth, France, when a rifle company was subjected to heavy artillery fire, and forced to withdraw under an enemy counterattack, LIEUTENANT BOLDING replaced his machine gun section to cover the withdrawal. Personally firing one of the guns, he successfully repulsed the counterattack, permitting the company to withdraw. After the entire company reached safety, he himself, withdrew. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Johnson City, Tennessee.

Staff Sergeant Leo M. Siewers, 35253567, Field Artillery, Company "A", 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 31 December 1944 near Hostenbach, France, during an impending enemy counterattack, Sergeant Siewers split his platoon in two sections and took command of one section. During the night despite enemy attacks, shell fire and broken com-

munications, he kept his section intact by his cool judgment and action. I -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the silver star is awarded to following named individuals:

Private First Class Charles A. White, 38562414, (then Private), Infantry, Company "I", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 25 January 1945, near Nieffern, France, when heavy artillery and mortar fire blasting his company's positions, severed a communication line between a platoon and the company command post, Private White voluntarily exposed himself to the hostile shelling and also small arms and machine gun fire in order to repair the line. Although machine gun fire tore his pack as shrapnel continued to cut the wire, he remained exposed, repairing the line and enabling artillery fire to be directed on the enemy positions. Private White's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: San Antonio, Texas.

Corporal Charles E. Thompson, 36715901, Infantry, Company "A", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 13 March 1945, Corporal Thompson was a member of a three man patrol whose mission was to reconnoiter a heavily mined and defended area near Kindviller, France. Crawling through mined areas, and frequently exposed to heavy enemy automatic and small arms fire, he made his way a distance of three miles. On the return trip he many times left the known route to check other enemy dispositions in the area. Information gained from this mission enabled the patrol to lead a complete battalion five miles through enemy lines without a casualty in the jump off on 15 March 1945. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Staff Sergeant Ivan P. Svendsen, 32298797, Infantry, Company "A", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 13 March 1945, Sergeant Svendsen was a member of a three man patrol whose mission was to reconnoiter a heavily mined and defended area near Kindviller, France. Crawling through mined areas, and frequently exposed to heavy enemy automatic and small arms fire, he made his way a distance of three miles. On the return trip he many times left the known route to check other enemy dispositions in the area. Information gained from this mission enabled the patrol to lead a complete bat-

talion five miles through enemy lines without a casualty in the jump off on 15 March 1945. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Long Island, New York.

Private First Class Milford J. Thompson, 37327008, Infantry, Service Company, 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 3 December 1944 near Nothalten, France, Private Thompson was assisting in removing the dead from a mine field when a mine exploded, throwing him to the ground and seriously wounding two men. Dazed, he made his way to a road, then, observing a comrade with a leg blown off, entered the mine field again and assisted in carrying the casualty to safety. Private Thompson's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Simpson, Minnesota.

Private First Class Robert E. Allmon, 37446456, Infantry, Service Company, 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 3 December 1944 near Nothalten, France, Private Allmon was assisting in removing the dead from a mine field when a mine exploded, throwing him to the ground and seriously wounding two men. Dazed, he made his way to a road, then, observing a comrade with a leg blown off, entered the mine field again and assisted in carrying the casualty to safety. Private Allmon's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Missouri Valley, Iowa.

FIRST LIEUTENANT WILLARD W. HERBERT, 01301299, (then SECOND LIEUTENANT), Infantry, Company "I", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 21 March 1945, near Reisdorf, Germany, LIEUTENANT HERBERT's platoon, spearheading an attack, was subjected to heavy rifle and machine gun fire from pillboxes and well camouflaged trenches. Deploying his two leading squads to lay down a base of fire, he personally led one squad and knocked out a pillbox, killing and capturing six of the enemy. Still under heavy fire, he returned to the other squads and directed fire into the enemy trenches. Leading another squad, he knocked out three machine guns, killing the gun crews and capturing 14 enemy riflemen. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Lake Charles, Louisiana.

FIRST LIEUTENANT EERA S. LAMBIN, 0547069, (then SECOND LIEUTENANT), Field Artillery, Battery "C", 382d Field Artillery Battalion. For gallantry in action. From 20 to 23 March 1945, near Reisdorf, Germany, LIEUTENANT LAMBIN constantly remained with the foremost elements of the attacking infantry in the penetration of the Siegfried Line. He voluntarily reduced his four man party to two men and he himself carried the heavy radio. Over extremely difficult terrain in the face of enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire he constantly forged ahead to locate the enemy and direct effective artillery fire. His actions which materially assisted the infantry in its advance reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Cleveland, Ohio.

CHAPLAIN (CAPTAIN) WILLIAM V. CUMMINGS, 0551805, Corps of Chaplains, Headquarters 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action from 26 November 1944 to 3 May 1945. Throughout the operations in France, Germany and Austria, CHAPLAIN CUMMINGS remained with the advance aid station of the First

Battalion, 409th Infantry, comforting the wounded and aiding the Battalion Surgeon. On one occasion when a man was seriously wounded by a mine, he accompanied the Surgeon into the mine field. Although a detonated mine wounded him and mortally wounded the Battalion Surgeon, CHAPLAIN CUMMINGS, despite his own painful injury, administered aid and comforted the man. His unselfish actions materially contributed to the high morale within the battalion. Residence: Runxpanney, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class Ivan B. Fagre, 37550634, Infantry, Company "C", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 21-22 April 1945, when Company "C", 410th Infantry was isolated in Erkenbrechtswiller, Germany, Private Fagre volunteered to deliver messages to all of the platoons. Although continuously exposed to small arms, mortar, rocket and artillery fire he carried messages from one end of the town to the other. While leading an aid man to an isolated squad, he was confronted by three enemy soldiers, and although seriously wounded himself, in the ensuing fire fight, he killed two of the enemy and wounded the third. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Park Rapids, Minnesota.

Private First Class Russell H. Campbell, 36896416, Infantry, Company "A", 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 15 March 1945, near Muhlhausen, France, when Company "A", 411th Infantry, advancing through machine gun and artillery fire, suffered casualties in an enemy mine field, Private Campbell made his way into the field and evacuated several casualties. Informed that a comrade was still missing, he again entered the mined area and finding the man dead, returned to his company. Private Campbell's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Staff Sergeant Robert C. Meredith, 34497557, Infantry, Company "E", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 23 January 1945, near Schillersdorf, France, when an enemy counterattack threatened to break through our defenses, Sergeant Meredith volunteered to lead his mortar section as riflemen in an attempt to dislodge the enemy. Leading his men across 200 yards of open terrain in the face of small arms and machine gun fire, he rapidly closed in on the enemy. In the ensuing fire fight 25 SS Troops were killed and the lost ground regained in the counterattack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Elizabethton, Tennessee.

II -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to following named individual:

CAPTAIN ADRIAN E. LEON, 0549361, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 3 May 1945, near Zirl, Austria, when elements of the First Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment were halted in a mine field and suffering casualties, CAPTAIN LEON set up an aid station on the edge of the field. Disregarding enemy artillery, small arms and sniper fire, he continued administering aid and speedily evacuated the wounded. Hearing

a cry for aid from a seriously wounded man in the mine field, and despite warnings of the danger, CAPTAIN LEON entered the field to aid the casualty. Before he could reach the casualty, he was mortally wounded by a mine explosion. CAPTAIN LEON's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: New York, New York. Next of kin: Mrs. Naomi P. Leon, (Wife), 99 Central Park West, New York, New York.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individual:

Sergeant Orlo G. Wonnacott, 35284805, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945, near Ingwiller, France, when the Second Battalion, 411th Infantry suffered heavy casualties, Sergeant Wonnacott led two litter squads forward over mined areas and through artillery fire, which several times forced them to disperse. Upon reaching a bridge, sniper fire forced the men to take cover. Although the bridge was then struck by artillery fire, Sergeant Wonnacott led the men through the stream and on to the casualties. Using every possible conveyance he directed the evacuation of the wounded until ordered to stop at midnight. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Cleveland, Ohio.

IV - AWARD OF OAK-LEAF CLUSTER TO BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster to Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individual:

CAPTAIN HENRY J. KLATT, 01299902, Infantry, Company "C", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action from 29 April to 5 May 1945 in Austria. During the attack from Scharnitz to Reith, Austria, CAPTAIN KLATT skillfully led his men through two pockets of enemy resistance against small arms, artillery, mortar and machine gun fire inflicting heavy casualties upon the enemy. By his aggressive leadership and sound tactical decisions, CAPTAIN KLATT cleared the way for continued attack in the minimum amount of time and with extremely light casualties. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Clarence, Iowa.
