Hopefully, a breakfast can be arranged similar to the one in St. Louis. It was nice having a modified continental breakfast where we could all be together in the Division hospitality room.



(103d VETERAN) DICK MUSSETT'S DEDICATION DESCRIPTION

What a glorious day near the Oklahoma border was N ovember 11, 2006. Cool breez e, brilliant sunshine, enormous boisterous crowd, great speeches and comfor table chairs. All of these combined to make the afternoon an utter delight to the participants and local people alike.

The memorial statue stands on a knoll of high ground easily seen from US-1-35 and the Texas Travel Information Center. From the base of the statue looking west into the sun you can see the old silo water tower from our time and the rolling brown hills we romped over that summer of 1944. You could almost hear the crunch of demo mortar fire or was it only the wind buffeting your hearing aids.

Barbara and I arri ved at the si te several minutes pri or to the 1500 hr. start ti me. When you arri ve from the south you have to go all the way to the Red River for a cross over (under) to double back to the west side of the highway. The river was running wild and almost blood red. Kinda scary. I can vaguely remember one night bivouac the company made to the bank of the river. It was so dark you could have almost walked right into the stream without knowing it.

Even a half hour before start ti me there was huge crowd of people, cars and trucks already there. We walked up the hill from the parking lot to the memorial site. Even from a hundred yards away the looming hulk of the covered statue stood out on the horizon. It was covered with an olive drab parachute that came down all the way below the pedestal. It looked like a miniature version of the Matterhorn in Switz erland.

A 16 ft cement walkway extends from the edge of the parking lot up to the memorial.

There was a brass quintet of soldiers from Fort Sill playing military tunes just to the right of the statue. If you looked back to the west and down the hill toward the parking lot you could see a sea of people crowding together for the festivities.

At that moment the festivities began so I returned to my seat on the second row of chairs not 20 feet from the podium. By the way, when we first arrived we sat down and the wife of the mayor of Gainesville was seated beside us. She is a charming young woman and extolled the virtues of living in Gainesville.

I wish they could have been in Dallas with us.



OPERATION ROLL CALL (ORC) from Al Eucare

Thanks to all those who have responded to the ORC letter sent this past August to all listed on the Master Living Roster (MLR). Sending the three rosters (Unit, State, and Lost) was well worth the effort. For the first time ever, the technology of computer and internet made it possible to gather and distribute the mass of data contained in the rosters. Through our combined efforts communication can be even easier as the ORC program progresses and expands.

Volunteers from among our decedents are always welcome to contribute to the efforts in collecting and data entry of unit Morning Reports data. A new effort for ORC is the collection of an e-mail address for all those listed in the MLR. A pilot effort is underway for K Company 409th, and Wisconsin. This effort is being undertaken in order to establish a more timely system for notifying the Assn. of the death of a Cactus man and for notifying unit members and those living within the state. Ancillary to this effort is the development of Unit Representatives. They should be the first recipient of death notices from the family. Hence, knowing contact data of the Unit Rep. is paramount. A Roster of Unit Reps. Will be made available NLT next newsletter. Board member unit representative should continue to be notified.

It is planned to send all those listed on the MLR a <u>CACTUS HISTORY CARD</u> from On-Card Co. Your name and 103d history will be on the card. An annual calendar will be on one side of the card. You may order as many as needed for distribution to your relatives and decedents. The cost is \$1.00 each. The following are from the files of Harold Branton featuring Co. G 410th Infantry Regiment.

The 103d Infantry Division was committed to action on the ETO Line on 10 November 1944. Location: Heading northeast from the western heights overlooking the historic city of St. Die which was nestled astride the Meurthe River, Department of Lorraine, northeastern France. DIVISION MISSION: Attack in zone, drive the enemy from the Vosges Mountains, seize BARR, BLIENSCHWILLER, and DAMBACH; be prepared to march on SELESTAT.

Following a period of intense patrolling, the Division commenced the attack to the northeast; 409th Infantry on the left; the 410th on the division right; 411th, initially in reserve, to seize SAULCY and protect the division right flank, to execute liaison with the 36th Infantry Division on right of zone. Resistance was heavy through the mountains, to stiffen severely on the evening of 29th November. Three fortified cities blocked he division's advance to the Rhine River plain and to the river. In-depth defensive positions were encountered along the eastern escarpment of the Vosges plateau. The 409th faced the city of DAMBACH ON THE RIGHT; THE 410TH faced BLIENSCHWILLER; and thed 411th was to attack the fortified city of BARR on the left.

The fierce fighting is portrayed in the four selective individual awards presented following the battle.

- I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Pfc Arthur W. Belliveau, Company G 410th Infantry. On 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of BLIENSCHWILLER, France. Pfc Belleveau's platoon was pinned down by an enemy machine gun. Leaving his sheltered position, Pfc Belliveau single handedly made an attack on the machine gun nest, killing four (enemy) with small arms fire and, although wounded, persisted in the face of small arms fire to wipe out the rest. With hand grenades he killed the five remaining enemy in the position. His platoon was thereafter able to continue its advance. Pfc Belliveau hailed from San Francisco, California.
- 1. AWARD OF SILVER STAR, POSTHUMOUSLY. Private William C. Weaver, Company G 410th Infantry. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944 near BLIENSCHWILLER, France, the advance of the 2nd Battalion was blocked by eney machine gun located on a hill above Company G's position. Pvt. Weaver, despite the intense small arms fire, single handedly attacked the machine gun nest. Although wounded in the leg by fire from the enemy gun, he crawled up the hill and firing directly into the machine gun forced the crew to take cover. As a result of his gallant action khis unit was able to continue the advance. Pvt WEAVER was killed in a subsequent action. Residence Cleveland, Ohio.
- 3. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Technical Sergeant Frederick J. Slyford, Company G 410th Infantry. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of BLIENSCHWILLER, France, TSgt Slyford advances to a key observation point under intense small arms machine gun fire and mortar fire. From this vantage point he observed an indeterminable number of enemy assembled for an attack. Realizing his hazardous position, TSgt Slyford rallied his small group and assaulted the enemy with hand grenades and small arms fire. Believing additional fire advisable, he dispatched two men to the rear to obtain a heavy machine gun. The machine gun was brought up and placed in a strategic position and fired directly into the enemy, completely disrupting their proposed action. He then remained with his group until medical aid could be obtained. Throughout th entire action TSgt Slyford's heroic action was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Port Huron, Michigan.
- 4. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Private First Class Gilbert A. Amendt. Company G, 410th Infantry. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of Blienschwiller, France PFC Amendt, a Browning Automatic Rifleman, moved into position in an attempt to establish a firing position. Soon thereafter he was pinned down by enemy machine gun fire from both flanks. In the face of great dander and with magnificent courage, he crawled forward under fire to establish a new position from which he brought fire on one enemy machine gun, effectively silencing it. Again he was forced to withdraw because of machine gun fire from the other flank. When his squad leader was killed, Pfc Amendt assumed command and without further losses moved his squad to a concealed position. As a result of his sound judgment and heroic action the remaining enemy machine gun was silenced and his squad was spared further casualties. Residence: Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. In consequence of the successful attacks against the enemy by the brave men of Company G 410th and the other units of the 2nd Battalion and the 410, in conjunction with the 409th and 411th Infantry Regiments and supporting troops opening the gateway to the city of Selestat.


