103d ID WW II Association 2011 Reunion Details and registration form for sign-up by our June 6 deadline follows with the detail reunion schedule on page 3 and the mail-in registration form on page 7. We believe we have an exciting mix of scheduled events sprinkled with unstructured time for your enjoyment of one of America's most interesting and fun cities to spend our 2011 reunion. Just in case you are looking for suggestions concerning your unscheduled time we have a few very exciting suggestions on pages 5 & 6. As you well know one of the key factors in our choice of New Orleans was that it was the location of one of this nation's most extensive and interesting World War II museums. Though it is privately endowed, it is well on target to be the most extensive in the country and thus a place for us to experience at this time. You will note that it is in an expanding mode and very anxious for both your financial support and your WW II artifacts and archives. We have scheduled a full day there on Friday, July 15th, which culminates with dinner and a Stage Door Canteen World War II Era Musical Show which will feature the music and dancing we grew up with. (It still is the Only music I know!) The museum has a sophisticated lunch counter and the first shuttle bus will leave the hotel for the museum at 10 am and keep circulating each hour and then bring us back to the hotel after the show at about 10:00 pm. Those that may be interested in other activities, again I refer you to page 5. The museum is about one mile due south of the hotel. Please note that Zack Sigler will have a greatly expanded 103d ID World War II display in our Hospitality Room at the hotel throughout our reunion and you may desire spending time there. For the very young, I would mention that there is a terrific patio & pool on the first floor of the hotel, in fact, our hospitality room opens onto poolside. Need I say more?

The Reunion begins with a Board of Directors Meeting at 4:00 pm Wednesday 13th of July, at the hotel, followed by a Welcome Social and Dinner at world famous *Arnauds' Resturant*. After dinner there will be an open discussion of reunion activities, informal discussion of some of the 103d Association's future activities and goals. Then for those that are interested, a power-point illustrated presentation of *Katrina-What Happened to New Orleans?* by yours truly who spent 7 weeks in the fall of 2005 helping to clean the place up and took a lot of photographs. One thought as a warning is the fact that while the "Big Easy" is a city of great restaurants so are the prices! Our salvation, however, is the great break we got with our hotel room price at \$20/night under the prevailing rate with no parking fee in the middle of the French Quarter. (Our room rate is \$99/night-11thru 19 July -1 to 4 persons)

The Reunion continues Thursday (7/14) with 5+ hour guided bus tour of New Orleans to see all the great places the "Big Easy" is noted for, along with several they wished hadn't happened, and arranged to be split in the middle for lunch on your own in the French Quarter market area, where you may have a few minutes for shopping. This event begins at 10:30 am on Thursday, the 14th, and returns to the hotel-almost, but does end at 4:30 pm. The evening is then available to spend as you see fit, unit dinners, or your favorite New Orleans restaurant. The bus tour price: \$22.

All-day Friday, the 15th is the 103d ID WW II Association Day at the National World War II Museum and with the shuttle bus running all day, you may spend all or any part of it at the museum, just as long as you are back at 5:00 pm for the WW II Movie, 6pm dinner, followed by the Glenn Miller Victory Big Band "In the Mood for Dancing" Program. The great songs and dancing of the WW II era have been put together reminiscent of the New York Stage Door Canteen which resulted in a movie of the same name. This event should be the highlight of our reunion and may well become THE highlight of all the 103d Association's Reunions! Prices on Registration Form.

The Reunion Culminates with two events Saturday (16th). You may start with breakfast in the hospitality room and continue with our annual Memorial Service at 8:30 am and business meeting including election of officers and choice of our 2012 reunion site. So from about 10 am to 5 pm will be "free" time for your choice of activity. You may go back to the Museum, do your own research in our Hospitality Room, pick an activity from page 5, or just relax at the hotel poolside. Then at 6pm we head for the dock via a shuttle bus and the riverboat *Natchez* for a dinner cruise on the Mississippi River, culminating with just relaxing before returning to the hotel by 10 pm. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Morning Reports & General Orders Currently, we have obtained the Morning Reports of all 103d ID subordinate units and we are now copying same with several people working separately transcribing the individual company M/R's. The period covered is March 1944 thru July 1945 and our goal is to have one-half of the 125 separate unit M/R's (60+) completed by this time next year. At present we have 25 units completed. Once the M/R's have been transcribed, they then may be accessed either chronologically or alphabetically. We are also programmed to obtain all General Orders of the division's units and currently we have about 75% of the unit general orders. These documents do not require additional effort, except to place them in organized files. Zack Sigler and his support staff are making great progress and you will find considerable additional materials available for your review at our reunion in New Orleans. Larry Wayne has recently returned from his trip to the national archives at College Park, MD, where significant progress was made in gathering 103d WW II records which he reports elsewhere herein as to his progress. Of particular note is the response we have witnessed to the website of the 103d ID WWII which Larry established and he has been operating almost 9 months now. The response we have received has surely justified the need for the website and it is very encouraging to satisfy requests for information concerning so many 103d veterans and their families. Larry Wayne has his own report and request relative to our website and I refer you to that piece in this newsletter. (Page 4)

103d ID WW II Association Sponsor of Veteran's WW II Books/Stories Since our 2010 reunion, the 103d Assoc. has undertaken the re-printing of two WW II combat stories. They are both excellent stories which illustrate outstanding examples of how this country put together a very effective army ground force of citizen soldiers that defeated an enemy force that came close to conquering all of Europe. Gus Enyedy's pictorial chronology of an infantry platoon is in the last stage of preparation for sale and distribution at our 2011 reunion in New Orleans. The primary distribution will involve mail orders taken at the reunion for shipment to those ordering same, although a few will be available at the reunion. It is a well written story of a line rifle platoon of citizen infantry soldiers augmented by over 200 pictures supporting the 103d's combat action from Chevry, France (just west of St Die) to Innsbruck, Austria. Two unique elements of Pfc Enyedy's book combine to make this book a must read and have for the WW II buff: 1) Stark proof that a picture IS worth a thousand words; and 2) The amazing find by the author and his use of large-scale detailed German maps bought in Marseille over the counter 6 months after the war ended to "trace" his progress. *Combat Diary* is 8 1/2 x 11, 200 pages printed 2 sides, some color pages, a heavy soft cover, and cost in the \$30 range. We know you "will not be able to put it down"! (It will not be ready until June.)

The Craddock Book was the other book we had been working diligently to put out there as a great contribution to the legacy of the citizen soldier concept of saving our country in WW II. The Craddock book was crucial because it was the only one in the inventory written by a company commander; and much more so because Captain Craddock was one of the very finest in both the opinion of his men and his regimental commander. We have not given up on its non-availability, as the heart of the story is too crucial to our legacy to not resurrect it from extinction. More on this issue after our reunion. In the meantime, we have focused on two great soldier's stories: 1) Pierce Evans' Papa's War - an interesting well-written story by a radio section crew chief of the 103d Signal Co, who after WW II experienced an interesting career in bringing CBS television to us all; and 2) John T. Dorsey Jr. a K/411th infantryman had written his combat action-filled story and his daughter, Frances Dorsey, assembled his work after his death and printed a limited version in a paper book form. Dorsey presents an interesting career with a doctorate degree from the University of Alabama and a political science professor at Vanderbilt University. As you would expect, he writes a great account of his experiences.

Additionally, the Stories section has been expanded to include available electronic books and a reading list of known books about the 103d Infantry Division and books written by veterans of the Cactus Division: http://www.103didww2assn.org/stories.htm. Zack Sigler has continued to complete unit Morning Reports. Additionally, a trip was made to the National Archives Records Administration where the Narrative of Operations for the 409th Infantry and 411th Infantry were collected. Those are currently being worked into format for posting on the web.

GREAT IDEAS FOR ALL IN NEW ORLEANS

Oh Wow! - Have we got a wham bam thank you mam, knees a knockin', shoulders a rockin', toes a twitchin', food is bitchen' kind of week planned for all of you - and that's before you even get out of bed in the morning - and for those that say "that's how every night is......well lucky you - you get it all in duplicate! Now New Orleans is unlike anywhere else in these United States historic New Orleans is bluesy and offers old world elegance and charm spiced with dashes of sultriness and intrigue.

We can bring you to Gentleman Pirate John Lafitte's Blacksmith Shop Bar, the oldest pub in the country, dating back to 1722, where he is seen occasionally with his pirate hat and some of his old cronies. The building once served as a front for contraband for the Lafitte family. With this given information, one can conclude that this is a hot-spot for paranormal activity due to its old history. Think hearty mates about joining a nighttime walking tour of the French Quarter where you'll visit several haunted sites and hear about the stories featured on The History Channel and The Discovery Channel. \$15./Thurs. night. If the nighttime is not your gig, let's set up a daytime tour of the city's oldest outdoor museums, it's historic cemeteries. Often called CITIES OF THE DEAD, noted for their unique, aboveground tombs. At St. Louis Cemetery, founded in 1789, SAINT LOUIS CEMETERY NUMBER 1 there are notable structures including the Locoul's Family tomb and the famed oven wall vaults, the supposed resting place of Voodoo Queen Marie Laveau \$12. - Sat. a.m. streetcar accessible.

OK, so paranormal not your potato chip, then why not come walk with us through a living history book, rich in Creole Louisiana's storied past. Visit the Laura Plantation....fascinating and compelling -it was the 2007 WINNER TOP TRAVEL ATTRACTION IN LOUISIANA - Laura is not a typical plantation home. Rather, it is a raised, wooden Creole style home painted yellow rather than an elaborate white columned, balconied mansion out of Gone With the Wind. Laura is also surprisingly small. Despite all this, Laura is unique and extremely interesting because visitors are able (and encouraged) to learn about the plantation's slave life rather than just the house and its owners.

At its largest size, it was approximately



12,000 acres, which included properties amassed over time. In 1804, Duparc, a French naval veteran of the American Revolution,

petitioned Thomas Jefferson for property. Duparc received a valuable plot of land and Jefferson secured Duparc's loyalty to the new United States.

This is a classic Creole house, simple on the outside but with real magic within. On display are more than 375 original artifacts, making this the largest collection in the region of items belonging to one plantation family. They cover a 200-year period and include household items like clothes and jewelry. (Of special note: The stories that eventually became the beloved B'rer Rabbit were first collected here by a folklorist in the 1870s.) Please plan on joining our tour, Sat. 10:a.m./\$18., just let me know, or if not, perhaps you would be interested in "On the French Quarter Courtyard" tour You can enjoy more of the amazing stories of Laura's Louisiana family and creole life in our Le Monde Creole Tour . Visit the website at www.mondecreole.com for more information. Or.....you can purchase her book and sit in the shade with a, oh i don't know, but you'll need two, because you won't be able to put the book down -



fascination, anticipation Memories of the Old Plantation Home Laura Locoul Gore compiled an account of nearly 100 years of life on a Louisiana sugar plantation named after her......or

What do you think about when you hear "New Orleans"? "Hurrah, hurrah, it must be time for Mardi Gras" - well, how would you like to come see where Mardi Gras magic is made. A guided tour of Mardi Gras World Tours includes video presentation,

and try on costumes. Tour prop shop and see the world-renowned masters of Carnival sculpture and float-building at work in their shops, weaving spells of wonder, including the 240 ft sea monster 'The Leviathan' and don't dare forget your camera! Tour includes King Cake and coffee. \$19.95 - Sat.a.m.

Not far from the French Quarter, is the Confederate Museum which was established in 1891 (giving it claim to being the oldest surviving museum in Louisiana; and currently houses the second-largest collection of Confederate memorabilia in the country. Louisiana's Civil War Museum at Confederate Memorial Hall opened so soon after the end of the war that many of the donated items are in excellent condition. Among these are 125 battle flags, 50 Confederate uniforms, guns, swords, photographs, and oil paintings. You'll see personal effects of Confederate Gen. P. G. T. Beauregard and Confederate President Jefferson Davis (including his evening clothes), part of Robert E. Lee's silver camp service, and many portraits of Confederate military and civilian personalities. How's that for getting your interest - \$7.00/Sat.

Now for families that have brought their children, we have some super ideas - we have a few tickets for unlimited rides for a full day at <u>Carousel Gardens Amusement Park</u> adjacent to Storyland in City Park. You'll be spinning on the Tilt-A-Whirl, knocking bumper cars, or gliding down the 40-foot fun slide in addition to enjoying more than 10 other timeless amusement-park rides. Sure it's going to be hot in July, but that's why ice cream and slushies are available. Just jump on the streetcar and it takes you to the front entrance.
